Kumamoto – Kita(North) Police Station



Architectural Outline

Known as the glass police station because reflective glass is used over the entire facade, this building has completely changed the public's image of the police. Basically it serves two different functions. The public areas such as the traffic department and the martial arts hall are on the western side (i.e. in the front) of the building, and spaces for official police business are on the eastern side. The eastern and western sides of the building have different structural systems, reflecting their different internal functions. The structure is steel frame on the western side and steel-framed reinforced concrete (SRC) on the eastern side. In front, the structure becomes progressively wider on the upper floors to accommodate a martial arts hall and galleries. Outdoor air conditioning equipment is contained in a black cylinder suspended from the side; the rooftop can thus be used as a place of assembly.
