Architectural Outline

Low-rise apartment buildings were introduced to create a sense of continuity with the surrounding residential district. Even the elevations of the five-story apartment buildings have been treated to make them resemble low-rise buildings. Inside the housing project, two- and three-story architectural elements give buildings a human scale and eliminate the usual perception of the south side of apartment buildings as the front and the north side as the back. The elongated five-story apartment buildings could have easily become walls, but two- and three-story high gates, provided at regular intervals, direct people's eyes through the buildings toward open spaces.
