Kuma High School of Industry Traditional Architecture Workshop



Architectural Outline

The project was conceived as four districts connected by a circular arcade and outdoor terraces. Pleasant half-outdoor spaces that take advantage of the climate and make use of the abundant greenery and west wind have been incorporated into the design. Because the Traditional Architecture Workshop is where students learn traditional architecture, the architects decided to make the building a pure wooden structure. It is a new form of wooden architecture that demonstrates the intriguing nature of large wooden framing and the beauty of light. The trusses and other structural parts were made visible from inside the building, so that the building itself might serve as educational material. Diverse structural systems, materials and finishes were deliberately used in the building and in the adjacent Planning and Training Building.
