
Shirakawa Bridge Landscaping



Architectural Outline

A bridge in an urban area is not just a road over a river; it is apt to possess a uniquely attractive spatial quality. This project was intended to transform a bridge that is directly connected to Kumamoto Station into a space for human beings once more and to make it a distinctive place people will remember. The pavement pattern and the street furniture, whose materials have been chosen to stimulate the tactile sense, will pique people's interest in place. The so-called "flying lights" overhead are objects that reflect sunlight and cast shadow. At dusk, lights come on and gradually take shape, becoming radiant objects floating in a pitch dark world. Shirakawa Bridge and its distinctive new landscape will doubtless become etched in people's minds.
