Architectural Outline

The letters spelling out "Koban" on the building is said to suggest a bird. Perhaps the sphere arranged on the floor of the plaza is seen as a golden egg. The space in front of the koban, where various functional objects such as a bench, an outdoor light and an electric bulletin board are arranged, is an open space where pedestrians can freely enter. The koban in the background is a simple composition of two boxes intersecting at right angles. The first-floor box creates a facade taking up the entire width of the site. The golden second-floor box, projecting out toward the street, serves to make the koban's presence known. It is hoped that people will come to love this mysterious landscape introduced into everyday life.
