Tomioka Park Public Restroom



Architectural Outline

The site is inside a national park in the northwestern part of the Amakusa region. The narrow peninsula has a rich natural environment with many flowering plants. In designing this public toilet, my objective was to create a comfortable space that feels open and through which the breeze blows. The building has an extremely simple structure that suggests the balancing toy called "yajirobei": a T-shaped reinforced concrete wall in the middle supports the large cedar roof. The building is open to the outside, providing only the minimum visual privacy. This assures ease of circulation by users. This will doubtless serve as more than a toilet; it will become a place where visitors to the cape can enjoy the sight of the natural greenery of the park.
