# Seiwa Bunraku-Mura Road Station Public Restroom



#### **Architectural Outline**

The Seiwa Bunraku Puppet Theater and the local-produce center, together with the rich natural environment of the area, give Seiwa a distinctive and attractive townscape. This building was built close to those facilities to serve as a station on the Seiwa Bunrakumura Road. The building is small but located at the entrance to the entire complex and thus serves an important scenic function. That was the main consideration in the project. However, the building is also meant to provide the other two facilities with support in an unobtrusive way. It was therefore given an extremely simple and easily identified form so that during the day when the other two facilities, which have very distinctive forms, are at their busiest, it plays a supporting role. In the evening, the building is lit up and changes in character, becoming a lantern and a sign for people on the road. It becomes more individualistic and creates a new landscape, after the other two facilities have closed.
